Because the Vienna Psychoanalytic Society was dissolved in the Spring of 1938, I sent my paper to Dr. Bibring at London. Meanwhile I had decided to come to the United States, and Dr. Bibring advised me to make my application to the American Psychoanalytic Association.

As the first Czechoslovak psychoanalyst, I organized the psychoanalytic movement in our country, and was giving regular lectures on psychoanalysis to physicians and pediatrists from 1929.

After 1933 the psychoanalytic training was organized and in 1935 our Group became a branch of the Vienna Psychoanalytic Society. Training and research seminars were held, at which I presented several papers.

In 1935 a Czechoslovak Psychoanalytic Study Group was organized for the dissemination of psychoanalytic knowledge, of which I was President.
