Concerning Otto's critical review of one of the two last Freud papers, I can think of one paper ~~of his~~ only. This was a highly critical review of "Analysis Terminable and Interminable," which was not published nor intended to be published, but sent around in a few copies to his closest analytical friends with the expressed remark "Nur fuer den Hausgebrauch." I assume that you by coincidence must have seen it. I ~~own a copy of this,~~ ^{own a copy of this,} which I could spare, and I will be glad, of course, to send it to you if you wish. Though I know it to be unnecessary and apologize beforehand for doing it, I can't help saying to please treat it as an absolutely confidential matter. That is the only review that I can think of since there has not been anything published as far as I remember.

I was very happy to read about the progress concerning the collected papers. It is really distressing that not all of Freud's works have been translated. They are badly needed.
