Minutes of the Meeting

The meeting was called to order by Dr. Lihn, Acting Chairman, at 7:40 P.M. All members of the Education Committee were present except Drs. Lewy, Rangell, Jokl, Kupper, Fielding and Mrs. Deri. Dr. Van Dam represented the Committee on Child Analysis.

1. The minutes of the meeting of April 1, 1965 were approved with the following correction:

Item VII: "Dr. Ekstein strongly opposed the postponement of the Education Committee/Faculty Meeting. He urged that the Education Committee not give up the initiative of leadership, of recommending and developing new programs and activities NOW. He felt that waiting for suggestions from the Joint Committee would paralyze our committee as well as the Training School and would also not be in accord with the wishes and expectations of our colleagues on the Joint Committee."

2. Dean of the Training School:

(a) Dr. Vatz proposed that at the next Education Committee meeting, all members vote by ballot for the Dean. The person receiving the majority vote would be elected. Dr. Greenson said that the selection of a Dean is a very serious matter and should be done carefully in terms of overall welfare of the Education Committee and the Training School. There has been such conflict in the last year that we should think seriously about the welfare of the Education Committee; the person we choose by vote should be one who is relatively acceptable to the majority of the people and one we can work with. Dr. Friedman reminded the Education Committee that the term of office is one year -- the unexpired portion of his term of office, 1965-1966. Dr. Ekstein agreed with Dr. Greenson and said we need someone who is a rallying force. Dr. Van der Heide believes that under present circumstances working with and getting nominations by the Nominating Committee will not work. It was suggested that nominations could be made this meeting for vote in June. Nominations from the floor may be made at the June meeting.

Motion: Dr. Vatz nominated Dr. Henry Lihn for Dean of the Training School. S/Dr. Brunswick, M/C.

3. Training Analysts:

(a) Since a misunderstanding apparently exists concerning Education Committee members over age 70, the vote on reappointment of Dr. Ekstein as Training Analyst was postponed until June.

(b) A letter from Dr. Leavitt, Secretary of the Institute, concerning an amendment to the By-Laws, was read. The Chairman was instructed to write letters to Drs. Jokl, Lewy and Mrs. Deri to notify and clarify that this amendment does not apply to them until their present term expires, unless they wish to resign.

(c) In regard to the retirement policies under discussion, Dr. Van der Heide brought up a letter from Dr. Walsh, secretary for the Joint Committee on Mutual Problems, concerning the efforts made by the Board of Trustees in inaugurating a retirement procedure for training analysts. Dr. Van der Heide said this letter was a frank expression of the Joint Committee, but Dr. Vatz had received apology from Dr. Leavitt, Chairman of the Joint Committee, just prior to the Education Committee meeting, for the content of the letter.

Vote on the proposed retirement procedures for training analysts was postponed until the June meeting.

4. Admissions Committee:

(a) Dr. Richard Coopersmith withdrew his application for training before interviews.

(b) Dr. Charles Smith was not accepted for psychoanalytic training.

(c) Dr. John Phelan was not accepted for psychoanalytic training.

(d) Dr. Ron Blanchette was accepted for psychoanalytic training.

(e) Dr. Jack Edelstein was accepted for psychoanalytic training.

5. Candidates:

(a) On basis of the training records received from the Philadelphia Association for Psychoanalysis, it was decided that when Dr. James Rosenblum has resumed analysis with a training analyst, a decision will be made whether he would start seminars in the Fall Trimester. He will probably be given credit for one year of seminars and will be eligible to take Colloquium I.

(b) Dr. Frederick Hoedemaker will be able to start seminars in the Fall Trimester if he has returned from military service in time.

(c) Dr. Carolyn Hays' request to take an unsupervised case was approved.

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(d) Dr. Paul Purchard's request for a 3rd case under supervision was approved.

(e) Dr. Edwin Kleinman's request for a 3rd case under supervision was approved.

(f) Dr. Leon Wallace's request for a 2nd case under supervision was approved.

(g) Dr. King Mendelsohn's request for a 2nd case under supervision was approved.

(h) On basis of his previous difficulties with clinical work, it was decided to postpone decision about Dr. Jacque Brien's request for a 3rd case under supervision. He may reapply after the summer recess.

(i) Dr. Thomas Mintz's request for a 3rd case under supervision was approved.

(j) Dr. Frederick Kurth's request to begin a case without supervision was approved.

(k) Dr. Elliott Foxman's request for Colloquium II was approved. His examiners will be Drs. Ekstein and Friedman.

(l) Dr. Jose Amador and Dr. David Abrahams were approved to take Colloquium II. Examiners will be designated at a later time.

6. Curriculum Committee:

(a) Dr. Evans read the tentative assignment of courses for the academic year 1965-1966. The schedule will be distributed as soon as it is completed.

(b) The Committee on Child Analysis will make recommendations for courses in the Special Training in Child Analysis.

7. Faculty Committee:

(a) Dr. Ekstein invited members of the Education Committee to attend the Faculty meeting on May 13, 1965.

8. Committee on Child Analysis:

(a) Dr. Van Dam reported on the establishment of the American Association of Child Analysts which gives a scientific home for people trained in the various institutes and at Hampstead Clinic, etc. This association is independent of the American Psychoanalytic Association.

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(b) The Committee on Child Analysis was advised by the Board on Professional Standards to work out training standards for child analysts which are in accordance with the training standards of the American as a prerequisite for recognition of child analysis training by the American.

(c) Dr. Ekstein suggested this issue be submitted to the Joint Committee for consideration so that they could come up with organizational solutions for the Hampstead members we have here.

9. American Psychoanalytic Association - Board on Professional Standards:

(a) Dr. Friedman reported the highlights of the Annual Meeting of the Board on Professional Standards, which are connected with training and membership in the American. These included three major items -- reevaluation of minimal standards, question of the three-year psychiatric residency, and the possible establishment of a new category of membership for those candidates who do not wish to do psychoanalysis after graduation.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:40 P.M.
